

# **Playground Workshops**

## **Public Workshop**

## September 11th, 6pm — 7:30 pm Waterfront Elementary BPS #95 4th St. Buffalo, New York

On September 11th, about 91 people from the community came out to Waterfront Elementary School to share their feedback on the draft design vision for Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Centennial Park. Michael Van Valkenburgh Associates briefly presented an update on the projects progress and next steps, as well as a short overview of playground design concepts. After the presentation, children and adults were asked to visit four interactive stations where participants could share input on playground design through fun activities.

**Station #1** – Participants chose their favorite examples of playgrounds from places around the world in four different categories.

**Station #2** – Kids and adults examined the model of draft designs for the Play Garden and picked which part they're most excited about.

**Station #3** – Kids used crafts to design their dream playground.

**Station #4** – Kids showed off their designs at the pictures station, where the project team captured photos of the kids' creations.











Children and adults were also shown 16 images of example playgrounds from other places around the world, broken down into four categories: play structure, nature play, water play, and theme play. Children were given four small green stickers, and adults were given four orange stickers, then asked to put the stickers on the images of designs that they liked the most.




