

She received her doctorate degree from the University at Buffalo and has since worked in a wide range of clinical settings including the neonatal intensive care unit, early intervention, schools, hospital rehabilitation centers, and in outpatient clinics. She is currently in private practice in the Finger Lakes Region and sitting for the Pediatric Clinical Specialized board exam this winter.

Sonya is a recipient of the 2012 Healthcare Hero Award from Cape Fear Valley Medical System, the 2010 Award of Clinical Excellence from the University of Buffalo and is a current nominee for the 2021 ATHENA Young Professional Award.

In 2015, she became co-founder of Inclusion In Motion, a non-profit born with the sole purpose of bringing a fully inclusive playground to Canandaigua, NY. These plans soon transformed into developing the first universally designed and certified playground in the United States thanks to a partnership with the Inclusive Design and Environmental Access Center (IDEA Center) at her alma mater, the University at Buffalo.

Sonya is a wife and a proud mother to two girls, ages 2 and 5. She is fueled to change the standard of playground spaces such all other children can play seamlessly alongside their friends, peers, siblings, parents, and grandparents; regardless of age of ability.
